What is a Watershed?

A watershed is the land area that drains into a stream or other body of water. Rain drops, snow melt, and even groundwater flows downhill until it reaches the lowest point, where bodies of water are found. The boundaries of a watershed are determined by the shape of the land.

Thousands of small watersheds drain into progressively larger watersheds. In Pennsylvania, there are six major watersheds, also known as basins. Depending on your location in Chester County, water form your property drains into either Susquehanna River basin or Delaware River basin. Water from these basins flow into the important estuaries of the Chesapeake and Delaware Bays, respectively. Like us on Facebook


